Pentecost 23rd May 2021

This Sunday we celebrate the great feast of Pentecost. It is sometimes described as being the birthday of the Church. Jesus has now completed his work of salvation with the final act in this being the outpouring of the Holy Spirit on his disciples gathered together in Jerusalem.

The Holy Spirit is the gift promised to the disciples by Jesus. The Spirit is the indwelling power of God within the disciple enabling the disciple to discern and do the work of God. That work is the mission entrusted by Jesus to his disciples when he instructed them to go out to the whole world and proclaim the Good News.

This task of proclaiming the Good News and bearing witness to Jesus is the responsibility of every baptised person. Each one of us is invited to be part of this missionary work of the Church which continues until Jesus comes again at the end of time.

In reading the Acts of the Apostles we see the power of the Holy Spirit at work. The Spirit transforms the disciples. It emboldens them and gives them the courage to go out onto the streets of Jerusalem and begin proclaiming Jesus as the Saviour of all humanity. The Spirit gives the disciples the wisdom and the words they require to do this.

Today we remember that we have received the very same Holy Spirit that came upon those disciples at Pentecost. The Spirit gives us the same ability to go out and to proclaim Jesus on the streets today. May the Spirit guide us in this work at this moment in time.

Re-opening for public worship

Please sanitise your hands on entry to the Church. Please wear a face covering while in the church. Please sit only in the designated seating and maintain physical distancing from other people.

Due to the limited capacity at present, it is likely that at certain times the Church will be unable to accommodate everyone who may arrive to attend any particular Mass, especially on Sundays. Please note that the obligation to physically attend Sunday Mass remains suspended for the time being.
