The Most Holy Trinity 30th May 2021

This Sunday we celebrate the Most Holy Trinity. We speak of God the Father, God the Son and God the Holy Spirit, three persons yet one God.

The doctrine of the Trinity is a difficult one for some people to grasp. It is not at all straightforward. We speak of the unity of the Father, Son and Holy Spirit while also speaking of them in their distinctive persons. The key to understanding the Trinity is in appreciating the relationship that exists between Father, Son and Holy Spirit. These three taken together are the revelation of God's love to us, which we experience in different ways. We typically speak of the creative love of God that brings all things into being when addressing God as Father. We recognise in Jesus, the Son, the redemptive love of God made visible to us in a human nature just like our own. We are empowered by the abiding love of God in the Holy Spirit dwelling within us.

From the earliest times the Christian community has understood God in this Trinitarian manner. We see a Trinitarian formula used in the Gospel this Sunday with Jesus commanding his disciples to go out and baptise in the name of the Father and of the Son and of the Holy Spirit. The Creed we profess at Mass is set out in a Trinitarian format and dates from the 4th century. Every time we bless ourselves with the sign of the Cross we invoke the name of the Trinity.

Glory be to the Father and to the Son and to the Holy Spirit. As it was in the beginning, is now and ever shall be, world without end. Amen.
